Ken Landoline, Big Sir

This health benefit is frequently reinforced in health reports and medical journals. Whether we realize it or not, staying socially active adds to our good mental and physical health in our senior years. More specifically, re-



maining social helps protect our brain as we age. An article I recently read in the Cleveland Clinic's "Men's Health Advisor" October 2023 newsletter even makes the important point that the lack of socialization has been shown to be associated with brain shrinkage as we age.

The article referenced a study of 8,896 people (average age 73) without dementia who underwent brain scans and health assessments and then reported on their level of socialization. A conclusion of the study was that the participants with the least social contact had lower total brain volumes as well as fewer remaining "important memory areas" of the brain, than their counterparts who were more socially active. These less-social people also had more areas of brain damage (white matter lesions) as was reported in an issue of Neurology, July 12, 2023.

The bottom line of this research, that we can relate to for our own purposes, is that "social isolation is a major concern". This is especially so among seniors and, as has been reported in several other research studies, social isolation is also linked to an increased risk of other mental and physical health conditions including dementia, cardiovascular disease, and depression.

How is this all relevant to us? Based on my own research and the studies previously mentioned, my conclusion is that our social involvement with SIR, as well as any other socialization we can have with family, friends, and through our volunteering efforts we may be involved with in our communities is contributing to our mental and physical health and allowing us to live a longer and happier life. My thought is that this is a powerful set of data we can use both in better understanding the role SIR plays in our lives, and in our recruiting efforts for our SIR Branch 161 as we look to improve membership efforts going forward. Please spread the word. I look forward to seeing you at our October 10th luncheon.

Attendance Policy (Revised July, 2012)

Luncheon meetings are normally held on the second Tuesday of the month at the Discovery Bay Country Club, 1475 Club House Drive. (There are exceptions when we need to hold our meetings on a different Tuesday, so please check the Meetings Calendar elsewhere in this newsletter).
