Golf News, Johnny Welton

It was a beautiful day and not too hot! The course was in very good condition and a good challenge. Thirty players enjoyed the best of Elkhorn Golf Course in Stockton. Jim Sniadecki had his best day with us as he led his team and the whole field. Also enjoying a personal great day were Mike Kaufman and Tony Rubino.



Jim Sniadecki positioned himself for his great day with a gross 85 score – the lowest of the day. Chris Diaz came in second in Flight A after a three-hole tiebreaker with Tom Denning (87). Also, in Flight A Rich Maniz had a net score of 76 for First Place and Erv Rivers was Second with 78. In Flight B it was Mike Kaufman's 88 for lowest gross score and Johnny Welton was second with 87. Tony Rubino had the lowest net score on the day with 71. Isao Nishijima was second (74).

Joining Jim in first place were Bill Konold, Tony Rubino, and Sol Robin with a team score of 133. Second place at 137 was John Emerson, Ken Fanucchi, Mike Kaufman, and Bob Rodrique. Third place went to Bill Dowden, John Jewell, Rick Maniz, and Isao Nishijima scoring 141.

Closest to the pin prize on hole 2 went to Jim Sniadecki (10' 2") and on hole 13 Phil Kepp (10' 5").

In the Skins Contest the guys with the great scores kept popping up: Mike Kaufman (4), Tony Rubino (3), and Jim Sniadecki (2).

We continue to work on pace of play and a lot of information is being read. Golf in the bigger sense is becoming more scientific than athletic. Whether equipment, technique, or psychological, everything has been measured and analyzed! So it is for pace of play. "Golfers identify pace of play as the No. 1 thorn in their side detracting from their enjoyment of the game" (Lucis Riccio Ph.D. Golf Journal Spring 2025 "Keeping Pace" by Jim Gorant). If the first group of the day plays only one minute per hole slower each hole it can mean 36 to 50 minutes extra or more for the last group. Many of the "speed up" tips they discuss and more are included in our SIR 161 "Golf Guidelines."

Most of us know how to speed up and play ready golf. We encountered something different at Elkhorn. The first two groups, with only three players, were done in about four hours. The next three groups were 4.0 to 5.0 hours. It doesn't seem like slow play for a foursome. The last three groups finished just short of six hours. What happened? The later groups started hitting before their assigned tee times and they lost the gap between teams. When there was a ball to hunt, or an extra shot, or extra time needed to line up a birdie putt – the time was lost to "catch up" when they started early. That is what the 10-minute tee time increments become. A buffer between teams. If holes were always completed in 10 minutes, there would be no waiting. But it is not just putting out – you must tee off in ten minutes to keep pace. As unrealistic as it is, it does happen but often it takes a little longer to play a hole. However, if you are on the first hole and you tee off early, you will lose the buffer and continue to press the team in front of you, which means you will wait ... the same amount of time that you were early ... plus the time that is added by each team ahead of you ... plus the time that you add. So, be advised that keeping your tee time may shorten your playing time. Do your own scientific study: Simply write down the time you start and the time you finish. Try different strategies and see which one pays off in real time savings and maybe we will be reading your article in The Golf Journal.

Attendance Policy

Luncheon meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month at Club Los Meganos at Trilogy in Brentwood. (There may be exceptions when we need to hold our meetings on a different Tuesday, so please check the Meetings Calendar elsewhere in this newsletter).
